## Navy Seal recognized by Obama for heroism

On Monday Feb. 29, President Barack Obama awarded Navy Seal Edward Byers Jr. with the highest military honor- the Medal of Honor. He was awarded this for his brave rescue of American citizen Dr. Dilip Joseph who was held hostage by the Taliban back in 2012.

Byers was a part of Navy SEAL Team 6- the famous group who took down al-Qaeda founder and leader Osama bin Laden.

The rescue of Joseph took place on the night of December 9, 2012 in eastern Afghanistan. SEAL Team 6 was less than 100 feet away from the building where Joseph was being held when bullets started flying. SEALs rushed to the door and Byers ripped off the blanket that covered it- exposing him to enemy fire. As Byers moved inside, a rifle was aimed at him, but Byers fired back. He threw himself over the hostage, protecting him from the bullets.

Joseph describes the rescue to CBS stating, "The first thing I heard was a gunshot. Then I heard my name, 'is Dilip Joseph here?' and that hit me, 'boy this is a rescue."

But tragedy also came with this successful mission. Leader of the mission, Nicolas Checque, was shot as soon as he entered the door. Joseph told CBS, "He died to save my life. It is hard to live with the idea that somebody died for my sake."

The special thing about this award is that only five other SEALs have ever received it before. Those being Lt. Joseph R Kerrey in 1970, Lt. Thomas R Norris in 1976, PO Michael E Thornton in 1973, Lt. Michael P Murphy in 2007, and PO Michael A Monsoor in 2008.

Joseph was glad to hear about Byers' award and told CNN that he was "thrilled that he is getting this accolade and being honored this way," declaring that he was, ""more than worthy" of the award. Joseph continued, "Byers gave me a second chance in life."

### Climate change affects mental health

Climate change is defined as a change in global or regional climate patterns, but it is has created a change in mental health, known as Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). The disorder is a type of depression related to seasonal changes that starts and ends at the same times every year. Most people's symptoms start in Autumn and continue on into Winter, which lowers energy levels and causes mood swings. Some people experience the opposite and have symptoms from Spring to Summer.

Symptoms of Autumn and Winter SAD include; irritability, weight gain, and oversleeping, while the Spring and Summer SAD symptoms include; weight loss, depression, and anxiety. In both cases, symptoms can start out mild and become more severe as the seasons progresses. People ages 14 and up are most commonly affected by SAD.

Another way climate affects mental health is natural disasters such as hurricanes, tsunamis, and tornadoes. According to psychologist and a professor at the University of New Orleans,

Carl F. Weems, "An intensely traumatic event will have a substantial effect on the mental health of many survivors."

"The more severe and intense your exposure to traumatic experiences during a disaster, the more likely that you will have severe mental health symptoms. If you watch someone die or your house floods, you tend to have more intense effects." Weems research suggests that 25 to 50 percent of all people exposed to an extreme weather disaster may experience negative mental health effects.

Heat is the temperature that can have the most negative effect on your mental health. Due to the rise in global temperature it can lead to increased heat exposure, It's been suggested there is a relationship between aggressive behavior and rising temperatures. This is shown through the rise in crime rates during the summer months. Events such as heat waves have been associated with mood and anxiety disorders, and dementia.

"In this country alone we expect that over 200 million Americans will have some mental

because of climate change," according to Elizabeth Haase, assistant clinical professor of psychiatry at Columbia University and New York-Presbyterian Hospital. Neshaminy senior, Caitlin O'Neill, and her mother both suffer from Seasonal Affective Disorder. O'Neill said, "The winter months are the worst for me and because of SAD my school work suffers." She has missed multiple days of school due to the lack of motivation to do anything and her grades go down from A's to B's. "I feel teachers should be aware of SAD," O'Neill responded when asked if she thought teachers were aware some students suffer from SAD.

O'Neill went on to say that, "If a teacher notices a student struggling for no obvious reasons then they should talk to them. Just by talking to a student they can make it slightly less stressful for them."

### Supreme Court Justice's death arises questions, concerns

In the wake of former Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia's death, the balance within the Supreme Court is now in question, especially with the upcoming election quickly approaching. While Senators struggle to find a compromise with the President, the Supreme Court itself is put in an awkward, but not uncommon, situation.

Formerly consisting of nine justices, the current court, with eight justices, are evenly split in terms of political ideology; John Roberts, Anthony Kennedy, Clarence Thomas and Samuel Alito stand for generally conservative beliefs and interpretations of the Constitution, while Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Stephen Breyer, Sonia Sotomayor and Elena Kagan represent the liberal beliefs.

This even divide presents an issue for those attempting to resolve their lawsuits at the Supreme Court--if the justices vote four-to-four, then the case does not continue in the Supreme Court and the decision made by the lower court stands as the final decision.

Thus, controversial and potentially ground-breaking cases, like those regarding abortion or religion, may end in a stalemate in the Supreme Court and be resolved

#### by the lower court's ruling.

However, there stands a greater problem. In the American government structure, there are three branches of power: the executive branch (President and the White House), the legislative branch (Senate and House of Representatives) and the judicial branch (Supreme Court).

What happens to one branch has an effect on the other two branches, and this relationship is being exemplified right now.

Under the Constitution, when there exists a vacancy in the Supreme Court, it is the President's responsibility to nominate a candidate to fulfill that vacant position and the Senate is responsible for either allowing or denying the chosen candidate their position as a justice.

However, the current Senate is composed of a Republican majority, and many Republican Senators have made it clear that they will oppose whoever President Barack Obama decides to nominate. Thus, a stalemate is reached between the executive and legislative branches, at the expense of the judicial branch.

The likely result is that no justice will rise to the vacant position until the elections come to an end in November. For now, the President and Congress will continue to conflict, while the Supreme Court will continue its session with eight justices.

# Look at it our way: Block scheduling helps long-term learning

It happens every year, a process formally known by the education system as "course selection," during which students determine the path of their upcoming year. At Neshaminy, the current schedule is set up such that students take eight courses over four marking periods on a six-day rotation. In neighboring school districts and states, the schedule is set up such that students take four courses over two semesters on a six-day rotation dubbed "block scheduling." The merits of this type

of education experience school boards have debated widely and Neshaminy too should consider its implementation. Far too many students are short changed on time on a daily basis between extracurriculars and then six-classes worth of homework to squeeze in on a five-hour period. Far too many assignments are completed during homeroom, the last few minutes of lunch or during another class. Perhaps if students had only four classes to attend per day, less of a burden would be placed upon them afterschool and they would develop a greater sense of time management.

The college admissions process also plays in instrumental role in what classes students choose to pursue and the attached workload and the attached state of mental health for the corresponding year. If a student wanted to pursue higher level classes, but was worried about balancing it with athletic or artistic involvement, block scheduling

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would enable him/her to indulge in both the academic and co-curricular experience with reduced stress.

From the learning perspective, longer classes mean extended focus on a specific topic and better retention of information beyond just the Advanced Placement exam. Teachers would also have a more personalized approach toward lessons and interaction with students; since they only receive four-classes worth of tests and paperwork to grade a greater amount of time exists to make comments and invest energy per essay.

In the twenty-first century, education reforms have occurred throughout the nation as several educators and researchers have studied what is the best way to shape a classroom in modern day with the presence of technology. The presence of block scheduling benefits the quality of lectures and fosters discussion-based learning based on longer class periods and less stress on students so more of their attention is directed toward the lesson.

Not to mention the fact that the United States failed to protect its on data during a disgusting data breach of the Office of Personnel Management that compromised the sensitive information of over 20 million people in 2015.

Fortunately, Apple officials have denied the request to create a backdoor for the NSA and Tim Cook has taken to making a statement defending his decision against it, acknowledging the negative repercussions that will undoubtedly follow. "The FBI may use different words to describe this tool, but make no mistake: Building a version of iOS that bypasses security in this he war on personal privacy reached an all-time high when the FBI demanded Apple way would undeniably create a backdoor. According to a study the National Alliance on Mental Illness, 1 in 5 children between the ages 13-18 has or will have a serious mental illness. Not enough attention has been given to this alarming statistic and the real question is: How can it be managed?

Mental illnesses may be invisible, but they are, in fact, very real: a PET Scan shows that there is significantly less brain activity in the hippocampus, which is associated with acquiring new memories and recalling old ones, and therefore crucial to the learning process that includes tons of memorizing vocabulary words and math equations. Tests can send students with panic disorder into attacks and group activities can be nearly impossible for students with social anxiety. ## Vinyls records return to music market

Like print books after the Kindle, after the popularization of CDs vinyl sales took a smash- but like a phoenix, the LP had to burn before it could be born again. Vinyl single sales peaked with 228 million units in 1973, the first year tracked by the RIAA, or Recording Industry Association of America, and LP/EPs hit their top at 341.3 million in 1978. CDs first scraped into the market in 1984, consuming, then surpassing vinyl sales.

Vinyl sales maintained at relatively the same levels between 1995 and 2012 with avid music collectors, 12 track jukeboxes, and radio stations maintaining the market, but in 2014 vinyl sales in the United States more than doubled.

The RIAA stated that they haven't seen vinyl sales this strong since 1989. More than half of current vinyl buyers are under the age of 25, consisting mostly of males, according to industry research organization, MusicWatch.

Many of the vinyl presses that have been revamped as a result of this boom in sales are finding themselves under more pressure than they can handle, more than the 100 tons of pressure needed to create the shiny, black disks they produce, as a result of excessive demand for their product concurrent with a shortage of the machinery used to make it.

"Our demand far exceeds that," General Manager Sean Rutkowski said. "We could run these presses 24 hours a day, seven days a week and still not be able to meet demand. Capacity is really the choke point in the vinyl industry right now," said Sean Rutkowski, the General Manager at Independent Record Pressing in Bordentown, New Jersey in an interview with CNBC in November.

Those who clung to the polyester ways of the pre-CD music world through the fall of vinyls hailed them as an experience for the decades, a way of life. The experience of buying a record, the warm mahogany sound that just can't quite be found on digital, the absence of top 40 artists in local record stores, being able to physically own your music.

Technically, vinyls don't sound better than CDs. "According to science, a CD and a vinyl record being pulled from the same original material are mathematically identical. Without going to [sic] far into it, suffice it to say that the 44.1 kHz/16-bit CD-quality spec isn't random—it's based on sampling theory, which proves that given that the highest frequency you can here is 20,000 Hz, using a higher sampling rate or resolution is mathematically inconsequential," said journalist, Mario Aguilar, in an article he wrote for Gizmo in 2014.

The same can not be said for digital recordings. "Most of the music you listen to is stored and broadcast in a lossy format, where details are lost and quality is reduced. This is because audio is compressed in order to make it small enough to shove on a phone, or to broadcast over the airwaves... Vinyl is what's called a lossless format... It sounds as good as the producer or band intended," said software developer, Matthew Hughes, in an article he wrote for Make Use Of in April.

Many theorize that the new-age wave of vinyl addicts aren't so concerned about the sound. Listeners seem to be finding their own ways to fall in love with the format.

"I personally like records because they make me listen to the full album rather than streaming music where I can skip songs at the press of a button. There's a lot more concentration that goes into records than there is downloading it onto a computer," said Neshaminy Senior, Thomas Banks.

"I think it might be for nostalgic purposes. My father played a lot of records when I was growing up, so that definitely influenced my decision to buy records. Maybe it's the same way for other people," continued Banks.

"Something about putting on a record brings [me] a good feeling," said Stroker.
