Big things are in store for Neshaminy Senior High School students.

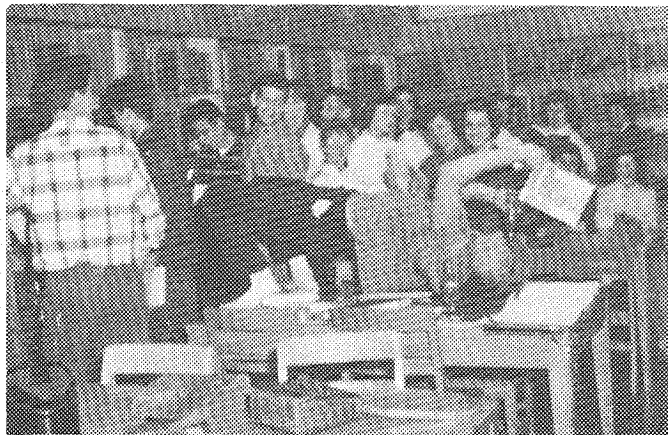

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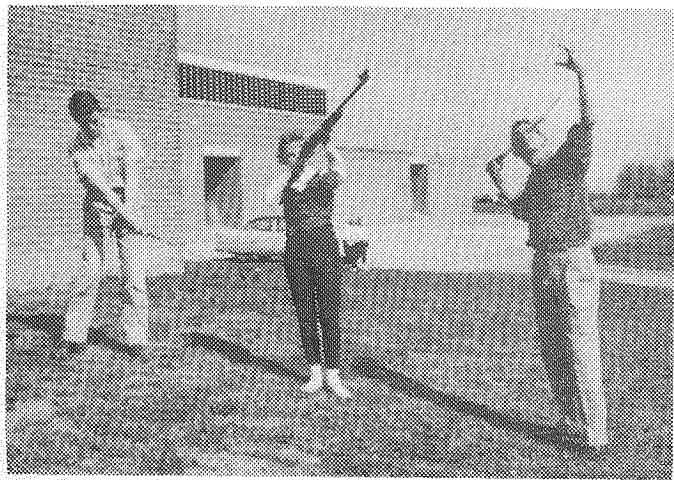
Diamondmen Unbeaten In League Play

Next, we played Palisades High School. Earl Patterson pitched the Redskins to a 12-0 shutout. This was his second league game won with no losses under his belt. Patterson aided his own game with a double. Bob Zehner hit a triple with one man on. John Herold went three for four. His league average at the plate is now .833.

When asked about the Eagles' chances for next season, Van Brocklin was noncommittal. He did say that the Eagles are now in a transitional period of weeding out "old men" and bringing in "fresh beef" to replace them. Norm is satisfied with the backfield as it stands, and thinks that that the last place Eagles should "go places". This opinion is also shared by the management. Proof of this is the fact that 13 out of 14 new draft choices are linemen. The last is a halfback.

Last year he set two new Eagle passing records.

Tough Tracksters Tear Thru Foes

Neshaminy's second meet was won 78-35 over Lincoln High of Philadelphia. Outstanding competitors of the meet were Craig Keown who scored 8½ points, Wayne Luke who won the mile in 4.53, and Jim Robertson who took the 440 in 53.7 and who also ran the final leg of our winning mile relay. Bob Kohler ran 2nd in the 440 and won the pole vault setting a new school record height of 11 feet. Harry Davis took the shotput with 42' 2¼ inches and won the discus at 112' 6".

On April 4, the Redskins struck against Delhaas, taking the meet with a score of 71½-41½. Craig Keown won the high hurdles in 16.0 seconds. John Werner took the 100 in 10.3 and Wayne Luke won the mile in 5:03.8. Jim Robertson took the 440 in 54.1 and Tom Walters led the Neshaminy hurdle sweep in 22.7. Paul Lewis ran one of his best races, coming in second to Walt Boone of Delhaas. Jim Flanigan took the 220 in 24.8. Our mile relay team of Kohler, Mather, Footland and Robertson beat the Owls by four baton carriers. Keown tied for first in the high jump with 5'3", Bob Kohler tied for first in the pole vault with 10' and Mike Karr beat Flanigan and Jim Nesbitt in the broad jump with 19' 5½".

I observe several consistent winners on the track team. Jim Robertson in the 440, Wayne Luke in the mile; Robertson, Bob Kohler, Luke, Wesley Mather in the mile relay; Kohler in the pole vault; and Mike Karr in the broad-jump. Karr almost broke the county record for the broad jump by half a foot, but it was declared a foul. So, we know Mike can break the record anyhow. Let's keep up the winning combinations.

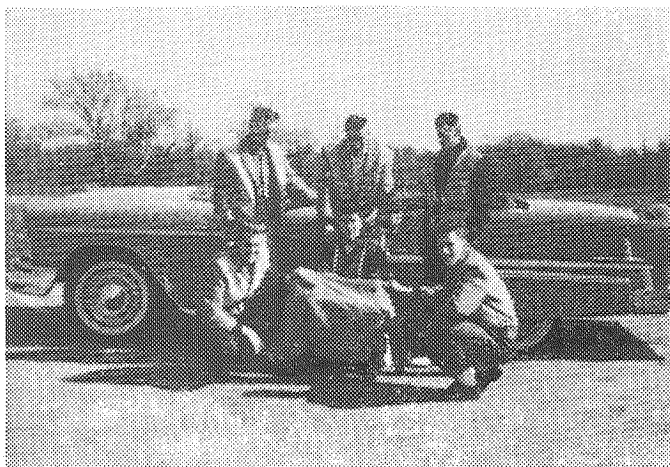
