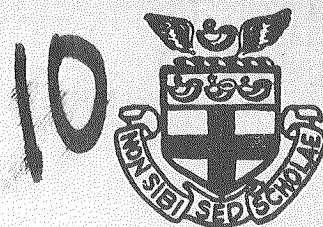

## Mc Bride Moves 'Fowahd' Into S.C. Presidency

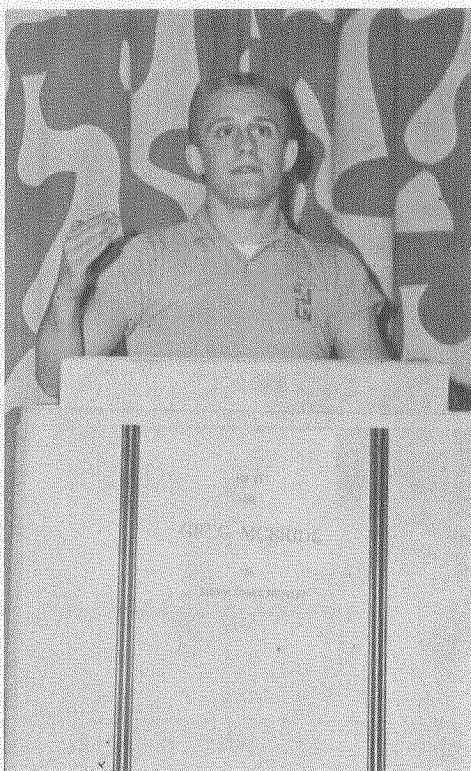
Greg McBride stepped victoriously into his own "new fronteah" Thursday, May 24, when he won the Student Council Presidency against candidates Brenda Weir, and brother Jerry Weir. Loretta Hubbert, his newly elected running mate, was called by her campaign manager John Wickelman one of "the most prominent figures at Neshaminy." The majority of the voters seemed to agree. Vice-presidential losers were Sophomores John Barth and George Klemp.

The campaign speeches were made during an assembly Thursday morning, and voting took place shortly afterwards. Dr. King began the assembly by thanking the present Student Council for the fine job that they have done in all aspects of their work, especially in their progress concerning the foreign exchange program.

John Ferguson, retiring President, after a brief address, presented the prize awarded for selling the most tickets by a homeroom to section 11-26. Another prize was presented to Marjorie Rudman, of the same section, for selling the most individual tickets.

The campaign speeches which followed the introductory affairs were both logical and entertaining and included such attractions as an address played to symphonic music, a flag-draped wagon loaded with pretty girls, and an entire chorus line of rather brawny football players. Besides the more humorous aspect of the assembly, a number of sound suggestions by campaigners should give a good indication that next year's student council will progress with the same rapid strides as did this year's.

### 'VENTURE' STAFF PICKED

Juniors Cary R. Nelson and Barbara May Phillips will head the staff of the Venture, Neshaminy's literary magazine, next year. Cary will assume the responsibilities of the literary editor, and Barbara May, whose brother Larry helped originate the Venture last year, will be the art editor. The Venture is advised by Mr. Jerry Sprague, who is also adviser to the Playwickian.

Despite the many difficulties that the Venture staff encountered this year, the major problem being a dearth of material, especially prose, they succeeded in turning out one magazine. Next year the editors plan to turn out two issues of the Venture, one around Christmas time, and another toward the end of spring.

Cary stated, "For next year's Venture we plan two issues, each between 50-75 pages long. Some of the changes made next year will be a harder cover on the magazine, and a portfolio of the year's best art work included in the Venture. We plan a wider selection of the year's literary efforts, and closer contact with the writers."

Since material is already being gathered for the first Venture next year, all interested students may submit material to C-14 at any time.

### Future Seniors Gain Parker As President

Scott Parker was again elected President of the Class of '63, against such formidable opponents as Ed Michaels and Tom Preno. Voting took place after the last junior class meeting when candidates gave their campaign speeches.

John Wickelman was elected Vice President despite the efforts of Barbara May Phillips, and Gordon Hershey added the position of treasurer to his string of appointments for next year. Carol Patterson and Bob Cummings ran against Gordon.

Mary Jo Webb received the vast majority of votes for the position of secretary, due partly to the fact that she was the only candidate running for the office.

To Sophomores and Juniors Move-Up Day means another step toward graduation. To Seniors Move-Up Day is the culmination of twelve years of learning and light-hearted pleasure. To one Senior, "It means just as much to me as graduation." Administration and teachers are behind Move-Up Day as well as students, for it gives students insight into the future, and the program itself gives an enjoyable and sparkling culmination to the school year.

## Summer School Offers Enriching Program

The fifth annual session of the Neshaminy Summer School should provide an enriching opportunity for the students in our district and others, from June 18, until July 27. The Neshaminy Joint Board of Education willingly sponsored the activity with the thought that "it is important for youth to enjoy their experiences today so that they will be prepared for the future."

Originally, the number of students to be accepted into the program was limited to seven hundred fifty, but due to many complaints and an overwhelming demand by more students and parents, registration was reopened. The expected number of students who will attend this year has been estimated at approximately one thousand.

A wide scope of subjects is offered, and although some of the

courses had to be dropped because not enough students enrolled in them, at this time there are at least thirty courses being offered. These are as follows: Grammar Study, Creative Writing, Vocabulary Building, Advanced Reading and Criticism, Drama, Public Speaking, Debating, Typing, Notehand, Supervised Work Experience, Basic Electricity and Electronics, Woodworking, Mechanical Drawing, the Slide Rule, Algebra Review, Advanced Algebra, Mathematics Improvement, Natural Resources, Earth Science, Introduction to Qualitative Analysis, Study Skills, Reading Improvement, Speed Reading, Humanism and Reason in the Western Culture, American Civil War, History of the World's Great Religions, Art, Practical Law, and Driver Education.

Mr. Edward Cunfer will be principal of the summer school program.

## Exchange Program "Over The Top"

Through the fine efforts of the faculty, students, and community in general, Neshaminy can look forward to welcoming two foreign students into the school district in the school year 1962-63. In the last assembly, of the year, John Fergusson, president of the Student Council, announced that N.H.S. has gone "over the top" in the drive to raise the the needed \$1,300 with the sum of \$2,464.65. The drive lasted two weeks in the Senior High School and was then continued by the students of the Sandburg and Neshaminy Junior High Schools. The 50-cent shares sold and the substantial donations received from various school organizations, showed concerted enthusiasm and work toward the goal on the part of the entire district. Outstanding contributions were gathered by sections No. 26, 44, and 51.

The Student Council, which has been developing an interest in this undertaking over the past three years could not have achieved its goal without the untiring endeavors of its sponsor, Miss Georgiana Staehle, and John Fergusson. Miss Truesdale, and Mr. Shoe, who represented the N.H.S. faculty in the program, were of invaluable assistance.

The financial committee under the leadership of Brenda Weir and her junior assistants, included Karen Cole, Carolyn Downs, Nancy May, Carol Patterson, Barbara Mae Phillips, and Richard Rogers.

Other committees were publicity, John Fergusson, Phil Schwartz, Dave Bugno, Frank Hague, and the boys of Mechanical Drawing I, the 6th and 7th periods; printing, all the boys of the print shop, especially Robert Grunwald, Candy Seller, Marilyn Siravo.

A few applications have been received from families desiring to establish foster homes for these foreign teenagers. Two applications are presently being screened by the New York office of the American Field Service. However, it should be noted that it is not too late to submit an application. Applications may be obtained in the guidance office.

It is hoped that in the near future Neshaminy students will be sent abroad to complete the exchange program.

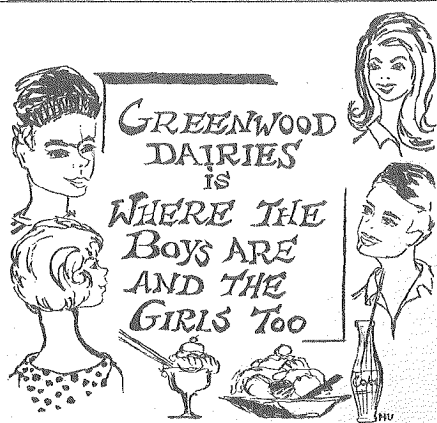

## NHS GRAD AIDS IN RESEARCH PROJECT

Samuel B. Romberger, a 1957 graduate of Neshaminy Senior High School, was recently selected to assist a research project exploring the "Solubilities of Ore Minerals in Hydrothermal Sulfide Solutions."

Mr. Romberger is a spring graduate of Penn State University and is now doing work as a candidate for his degree of Doctor of Philosophy. His high scholastic rating gave him the unusual privilege of working for his doctorate immediately after receiving his Bachelor of Science in geophysics and geochemistry.

### NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION GRANT

The important project that Mr. Romberger is working on is being conducted by H. L. Barnes of Penn State under a grant from the National Science Foundation.

What kind of a student was Romberger during his high school days at Neshaminy? He was the highest ranking boy in his senior class, a member of the National Honor Society, Dramatics Clubs, and Hy-Y (a boy's counterpart to the Tri-Hi-Y). He served on class committees, participated in gym nights and had a part in the senior play. Upon graduation, Romberger was awarded a Bucks County Pharmaceutical Award for science.
