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Graduation ceremonies cancelled for Class of '86

In what has proven to be a somewhat discouraging year for Neshaminy's class of '86, the final blow has been dealt. Today, the administration officially announced that commencement ceremonies originally scheduled for June 18 have been cancelled. In a statement released by the office of Neshaminy superintendent Dr. Joseph E. Ferderbar, reasons for the dramatic decision were given as "a lack of interest among the senior students" and "a great escalation in costs of the (graduation) ceremonies.' The announcement also pointed to incidents of unruly behavior at the ceremonies in past years, including beachballs, firecrackers, and nudity.

According to senior class adviser Dr. Paul Dickler, this action was not completely unexpected, "To tell the truth," he said, "I kind of saw it coming. These students just don't seem to get excited about anything. It would be a shame to waste so much money on an event that is looked upon as an unnecessary nuisance." The 1985-86 school year has been rather disappointing for Dickler and his class officers. Earlier in the year, efforts to organize the traditional senior class trip to Orlando, Florida flopped when too few reservations were received to warrant going ahead with the trip. Later in the year, a planned senior class dinner received a disap-

pointing number of participants. To top things off, Philadelphia's Bellevue Stratford

Hotel, where reservations had been made for over a year to hold the senior prom, closed its doors in March, leaving Dickler scrambl-

ing for alternate plans.

In an emergency telephone survey conducted last evening by the Playwickia, over 250 seniors chosen at random were asked their feelings on the decision: 12% were pleased, 54% didn't mind, 23% were disappointed, and 11% didn't even realize that ceremonies had been planned in the first place. Reasons for joy over the decision ranged from being able to get a head start on Senior Week festivities to "not having to sit through long, boring speeches in hot and humid weather." One elated student remarked, "Great! I would look stupid in a cap and gown anyway.'

According to Neshaminy's guidance department, seniors will receive a packet in the mail at the end of June. Enclosed will be their final report card for the year and high school diploma. Also included will be a letter of congratulations from the superintendent and school board, copies of speeches that were to have been given by the class valedictorian and salutorian, and a program of what the ceremony would have been.
"This approach has been used by several other school districts," said department chairperson Alan Tubbs. "We think it will

work well at Neshaminy.'

Neshaminy School District accepts weiahted grades proposal

Last week, the Neshaminy administration announced that it has accepted Student Council's weighted grades proposal. The proposal, which stated that the present system does not provide an accurate or fair measure of a student's capabilities, called for a system of weighting courses according to subject material and level of difficulty. An extensive study was submitted by Student Council several months ago, comparing class rankings with and without weighted grades. The results showed a great number of changes in the rankings, indicating significant need

Neshaminy principal Mr. Richard Evans, who was originally against the proposal, is now in support of it. "I can't believe that Neshaminy is still in the Dark Ages of education," he said. "Most of the schools in the area have had weighted grades for years now. This well-organized report by the Student Council really opened my eyes to this problem." Superintendent of Neshaminy schools Dr. Joseph E. Ferderbar was in agreement with Evans. "We are always looking for ways to improve education in our

district," he said. "Weighted grading is a more effective way of evaluating and ranking our students." As expected, members of Student Council and the weighted grades committee were elated over the announcement, and thanked the administration for its swift and efficient handling of the proposal.

The weighted grading system is slated to go into effect next year. However, the administration will be making some changes in the original plan. Because of ever-present threat of international terrorism, the JROTC has been given the highest weighting possible. Also, all honors and accelerated courses will be given the same value as a level one class, as students in honors classes don't really work that much harder. In the English department, it has been decided that Advanced Placement English will be given the value of a level two class, and all classes taught by Mr. O'Brien will be given the lowest weighting possible. These changes were necessary, says the administration, in order to make the system more equitable for all students.



The Student Exchange Club of Neshaminy is proud to announce their plans for a 1986 summer exchange with the country of Libya. After receiving hundreds of applications for this prestigious trip, Mr. Rowlands finally chose Chris D. Banks I to represent Neshaminy; this honor requires great diplomatic skill. When asked if he felt suited for such an honor Chris said only, "Well..." followed by several minutes of gesticulation.


